✤ Happy Trinity Sunday! In the traditional liturgical calendar, this day is marked across the world as the historic recognition of God's full revelation following Pentecost. 

TEXT: John 12 (Jesus concludes his public ministry)

*This chapter is one of the longer* chapters in John's gospel, and the material is quite dense. The chapter contains five discreet scenes or episodes:

- 12:1-11 Dinner with Mary, Martha and Lazarus, where Judas protests Mary's anointing of Jesus' feet.
- 12:11-19 Triumphal entry to Jerusalem, carefully monitored by menacing Pharisees.
- 12:20-26 Conversation with Andrew and Philip, when Jesus announces his impending death.
- 12:27-43 Answering questions from the crowd, who question and disbelieve his identity as the Messiah.
- 12:44-50 Final proclamation as the "light" against the world's "darkness," warning about judgment to come.

Baptist NT scholar, G.R. Beasley-Murray, wrote: "The great subject of chapter 12 is the meaning (Pastor Chapman's emphasis) of the death and resurrection of Jesus. The binding of these two events as an indissoluble action of God in Christ ... enables [John] to portray the redemptive act in terms of the *glory* of the Father and the Son." He notes that this theme of "glory" begins with Mary's anointing of Jesus with an embalming perfume. It continues with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, crowds shouting their acclamations of "Hosanna." Jesus then tells Andrew and Philip that he is about to be "glorified." John next includes a rare (for him) quote of the OT prophet, Isaiah, whom John said "saw Jesus' glory." Finally, John recorded Jesus last public proclamation that he came as a "light to the world," which John foreshadowed in his introduction (1:7-9), stating that the incarnate Jesus allowed us to "see the glory...as of a Father's only Son" (1:14).

**"Glory" is a difficult word** to define. The Greek word (*doxa*, from which we get the praise term, *doxology*) suggests "brightness, splendor, radiance." The Hebrew term for glory (*kabod*) is a bit more dramatic, probably derived from ancient observations of lightning flashes followed by thunder during a storm. "The heavens are telling the glory of God" (Psalm 19:1).

While we wrestle with definitions, most of us have a gutfeeling about the concept of glory. Glory captures our attention, and fills us with awe. Glory elicits natural praise, causing us to say "ooh" and "ahh" and "wow," words in English which are called "interjections," and which are intriguingly defined as inarticulate speech that is provoked from the depth of emotion. Jesus, at the end of his ministry, was prefiguring his glory. Many could not see this glory (12:37,43), including his own disciples, who only began to understand following his resurrection (12:16).

John seems to be suggesting that our goal as disciples of Jesus is to recognize and proclaim his glory. We can easily point to the glory of God's creation. We can also point to the power in God's word. But we can further share how God has made us say "ooh" and "ahh" when we have encountered a bit of his glory, as we join in the evangelistic efforts of those who bear witness to our glorious God.



There are several items to report regarding OCBC's ongoing mission activities and commitments...

✤ Racetrack Ministry donations will be ending this Sunday, June 7th. Those still wanting to donate may bring non-perishable foods (canned meats, soups, peanut butter, crackers, and non-refrigerated items), as well as non-prescription medications (Theraflu, Robitussin and aspirin). Ongoing needs include general household items, clothing and toys for various ages of children. Money, checks or gift cards to Walmart or grocery stores are also appreciated. All items may be given to Alice Meadows for delivery.

✤ Utica Food Pantry matching donation opportunity also ends this Sunday, June 7th. An anonymous donor has pledged to match up to \$500 in gifts. Checks may still be made out to OCBC, earmarked by memo for the food pantry. Bonnie Kohl will deliver our donations.

◆ One Great Hour of Sharing is a 71-year-old tradition dating back March of 1949, when churches were asked to take up collections to help with relief following the devastations of World War II. Incredibly, over 75,000 churches responded on short notice, and this offering has become an annual ecumenical effort ever since. The American Baptist Churches-USA has made the month of June our OGHS collection emphasis. We trust that OCBC members will once again consider generous contributions to this most impactful mission offering!

✤ Free Lunches at Miller Park Program has had to abide by necessary changes in the face of the pandemic. Children are not able to come and eat together this summer, but coordinator Rev. Scott Schieber says kids can still pick up meals to take home with them. The Salvation Army is providing personal protective equipment for all those distributing the meals. OCBC's designated week is July 13-17. Your Executive Board is still discussing how the church might effectively participate. Books that have been typically collected to give to the children locally, it was determined, should be donated to Neighborhood Ministries in Youngstown, Ohio, at this time.

\* Our own International Ministries of the ABC-USA continues to seek funds to make up for this year's current shortfall. The good news is that IM is also blessed to have a matching funds program that has been applied to the "Personalized Support Goals" effort that allows churches to target their giving to specific missionaries. Discussing our congregation's response to this challenge, your Executive Board approved the monthly pledge of \$100 to IM, to be specifically directed for the support of Tim and Stacie Reese. This delightful couple is well-known to our congregation as past pulpit supply and special missionary speakers. Tim and Stacie hope to go to the Dominican Republic to serve in community development in that very impoverished nation. We trust that God will bless them with the full support they need in order to answer God's call upon their lives.
